- 1. Direct participants back to their seats.

Conversation Two 10 mins.

1. Invite participants to turn their book to page 5 and their handout to page 2.

2. Ask them to **complete steps 3-5**. Make sure each table has the cardstock they need for step 5.

- 1. Tell participants to turn in their book to pages 6 and 7 and in their handout to page 3.
- 2. Invite them to complete steps 6-9.

Conversation Four

12 mins.

- 1. Tell participants that it is now time to turn to the final conversation for this gathering found on pages 8 and 9 of their book and page 4 of their handout.
- 2. Invite them to complete steps 10 and 11.

Closing 5 mins.

- 1. Guide the parents to the **For Home** page (page 5 in handout) and ask them to finish the rest of the lesson at home this week. Thank everyone for their participation and that you look forward to seeing them on _____.
- **2.** Conclude with the Closing Blessing from *Call to Celebrate Reconciliation* found on page 10.







Chapter 1 Begins on page 2

Conversation One

In the opening prayer on pages 2 and 3, we celebrate being called by name. In our spiritual lives, the practice of naming is traditionally associated with Baptism. In Baptism, we receive the name Christian that marks our identity with the community and then our own first name, as each of us is called by God. Baptism is about being called by name by God and the community. Who you are in Christ and the lifetime journey of growing into his image and likeness are what we celebrate in Baptism.

- 1. Invite children to share their favorite part of the opening prayer on pages 2 and 3. Share what part you liked best. Make sure you each explain why you liked the part you chose.
 - What did the prayer tell you about God? (Possible responses: we are called to walk with God; God gives us life; God loves us so much and knows our names.)
- 2. Tell your child that the opening prayer reminded us that God calls us by name to live in love with him and with each other. Share with children why you gave them the name they were given at Baptism (first and middle). Share with children the story of your name if you know it.

Conversation Two

- **3.** Turn to page 5 in your book and read it together, taking turns reading with your child if possible. Begin with *God's Children*, then read *Words of Faith*.
- **4.** Share why you chose to have your child baptized and share some memories of that day. (What was the name of the church where you were baptized? What was your child wearing? Who bought the clothes? What color was the outfit? Who were his/her godparents? Why did you choose those people?)
- **5.** Names are important to us. They are a big part of who we are. We like to see our name spelled right, we like to hear it pronounced correctly. Work alongside your child to create name cards for each of you:
 - Take a piece of card stock from the table and fold it in half, length wise.
 - Write your name on one side of the card stock in large letters.
 - Decorate the back side of the card stock (so when you place it on the table your name is on the front and it is decorated on the back) with words and drawings that will tell others something about you.

Conversation Three

- **6.** Ask your child, How do the people around you show that they love you? (Possible responses: they take care of me, they hug me.)
- **7.** Tell your child that God loves us more than anyone on earth. Now read together *God Loves Us*.

Before you read *God Gives Everyone Life* on pages 6 and 7, remind children that the word Scripture is another name for God's word. When we read from the Bible, we believe that God is sharing his life with us. The Holy Spirit helps us understand who God is and who we are as children of God. Before you begin to read from Scripture ask children to close their eyes and quietly ask the Holy Spirit to be with you as you read.

Read the passage from Scripture.

Ask your child to describe the story back to you.

8. Now, spend some time talking about the questions on page 7:

What does Paul teach us about God? (Possible responses: God loves us because we are his children. God loves us so much he created this beautiful world for us to live. He sent Jesus to show us how to better love each other.)

How do you answer God's call to love him? (Possible responses: follow Jesus; serve others; love others as God loves me.)

How have you and your family come to know God? (Possible responses: through other people, attending Mass, prayer.)

9. Look at the *Share* box on page 7 and work with your child to write a statement about how God shows his love.

Conversation Four

10. Turn to page 8 and read the *Faith Focus* together.

Recall for children a time when they disobeyed you. Remind them of the consequences that came from that action. (For example: Ran through the living room after you said not to; knocked over a lamp and broke it; was not allowed to go on the computer for a week). Explain to your child that God always lets us experience the consequences of our choices, just like the first people.

Still, God thought of a way to save us from our bad choices. He sent us Jesus. The sacraments are Jesus' gift to us to help us know he is with us always.

Now read page 9 together.

11. Take out the *We Are Called* activity sheet and work with your child to complete it.



Chapter 2 Begins on page 12

Conversation One

From the moment of our Baptism, we begin a lifetime journey of growing in holiness, opening our hearts to becoming all that God imagined us to be. Sometimes we make unloving choices and damage our relationships. No matter what unloving choices we make, God is always ready to begin again. The Sacrament of Penance (Reconciliation) helps us recall God's endless love for all people. The priests who celebrate this sacrament reflect the care, acceptance, and mercy of Christ. The church hopes that all who celebrate this sacrament hear Jesus speaking to them in loving forgiveness.

- 1. Invite children to share their favorite part of the opening prayer on pages 12 and 13. Share what part you liked best. Make sure you each explain why you liked the part you chose.
- **2.** Turn to page 14 and review the *Reflect* box. Help your child draw one way they can march in the light of Christ (helping others, paying attention to what someone needs).
- **3.** When children have completed their picture and you have helped them to write their sentence, turn to page 15 and read it together.
- **4.** Ask children to tell you what makes something a sin. Be sure they understand that sins are deliberate, wrong, and hurtful actions. Mistakes and accidents are not sins.
- **5.** Share these examples with your child and discuss which are sins and which are not. Make sure you discuss why.

During a game, you try to kick a soccer ball, but kick another player's leg. (No, it was an accident).

You take a toy from a friend's room without asking and it gets broken. (Yes, you took something without asking; perhaps the breaking was an accident, but it was wrong to take it.)

You are setting the table and a glass slips out of your hand and breaks. (No, it was an accident)

One of your friends takes something from you and you are so angry that you punch him/her in the arm. (Yes, you chose to punch and hurt him/her.)

Conversation Two

6. Jesus welcomed everyone, whether they were sinners or not. Today you will be reading the story of Zacchaeus, a tax collector. In Jesus' time, tax collectors were known as sinners because they did undesirable work for the Romans, the people who occupied their country. Not only did they collect taxes for the enemy, but they often took extra profit for themselves.

Read the Faith Focus on page 16.

Before you read *Zacchaeus* on pages 16 and 17 remind your child that you are about to hear God speak to you in his word, the Bible. Stop and silently ask the Holy Spirit to open your heart as you listen to his word. Read the story and have your child tell it back to you.

Discuss the questions:

Why do you think Jesus decided to stop at Zacchaeus' house? (Possible responses: he liked Zacchaeus; Zacchaeus had worked hard to see Jesus, Jesus felt sorry for him; Jesus wanted to show his disciple that God loves everyone.)

How would you feel if Jesus came to your home? How would you change?

7. Take out the *We Are Welcomed* activity sheet and work with your child to create a flip book about Zacchaeus.

Conversation Three

8. Remind your child that an action is sinful when we know something is wrong and do it anyway. Now read together, taking turns, pages 18-19.

Note: Remember that a mortal sin is something that is grievously wrong, like murder. A venial sin is a less serious violation of God's law, like becoming angry at someone. Your child should understand that sin is an unloving choice done on purpose. Your child will understand the idea of more serious sin as he/she hears about it or witness it. It is important to reinforce now, that God's love can forgive anyone as long as he/she is truly sorry.

9. Turn to page 20 and help children write a letter in the Respond section. Encourage them to note any questions they might have about the Sacrament of Penance.

- 1. Open your Bible and read together Luke 19:1-10. Now, turn to the *Act* section on page 21 and talk about the passage using the questions provided in the *Share Together*.
- 2. Pray together the Family Prayer at the bottom of page 21.

- 1. Guide the parents to the **For Home** page (page 5 in handout) and ask them to finish the rest of this lesson at home this week. Thank everyone for their participation and say that you look forward to seeing them on ______.
- **2.** Conclude with the closing blessing found on page 30.







Chapter 3 Begins on page 22

Conversation One

When a person looks at something through a prism, the angle at which the prism is held determines the colors that will cover the object being viewed. When Christians review their sins and failures, they are able to view them through the prism of God's love and compassion, whose perfect sign of that love is the cross.

All the laws and teachings of the Church flow from the great command of Jesus to love God, and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Because the love of God is made visible in Christ and in the love that Christians have for others, sin also becomes visible through the breaks caused in these relationships. The awareness of sin in one's life is a great opportunity for conversion. When people take the time to acknowledge their failure, God's response is always an ever more powerful grace that both forgives and calls for a change of heart. The Sacrament of Reconciliation celebrates that forgiveness and change of heart.

1. Invite children to share their favorite part of the opening prayer on pages 22 and 23. Share what part you liked best. Make sure you each explain why you liked the part you chose.

Note: The prayer service honored the Word of God by inviting you to bow before it. Bowing is a gesture of reverence, a way of showing that we know something or someone is holy (deeply connected to God's presence)

Conversation Two

- 2. Read together page 25, including Signs of Faith.
- **3.** Ask children to name their favorite Bible stories. Share with them your favorite Bible story and why it is your favorite. (Possible responses: The Lost Sheep; The Prodigal Son; The Good Samaritan; the Christmas Story; The Easter Story)
- **4.** Word Game Challenge! Work with your child, in the space below, to think of as many words as you can that begin with different letters of the alphabet to describe God. For example,

God is...Awesome...Beautiful...Caring...Dedicated... Everlasting...Fulfilling...and so on! Can you make it to the letter Z?

Conversation Three

5. Read together page 26. Before you read, remind your child that you are about to read from Scripture, the word of God. As Catholics, we believe that God's word helps us to grow as his disciples (followers). Before you begin to read from his holy word, quietly ask the Holy Spirit to help you hear what God wants to share with you.

Ask your child to tell the story back to you.

Now, read page 27.

Discuss the questions on page 27:

What was Jesus trying to tell the man? (Possible responses: If we love God and our neighbor we will go to heaven; if you keep these two laws you will keep all the others.)

When does following a commandment make you happy? (Possible responses: When I honor God by praying; when I am kind; when I share; when I obey.)

6. Take out the *We Reflect* activity sheet. Notice that the first three commandments help us to understand how we can love God. Read through the instructions with your child, then read together the commandment on each bookmark. Work with your child to color them and cut them out.

Conversation Four

- 7. Read together pages 28 and 29. We need to examine our conscience in order to know how we do not love as God asks. It takes courage to admit that we have done something wrong. Think of a time your child has admitted to something they have done wrong. Share that memory with him/her and say how proud you are of him/her when they do so. Tell your child about a time when you did something wrong and how difficult it was to admit (a time when you overreacted in anger, when you told a lie for convenience, or perhaps ignored a request for help).
- 8. Work with children to create an Examination of Conscience that is specific to their life. For example, Do I share with my brother? Do I help my sister without complaining? Do I do what my parents ask the first time they ask me? Do I respect my teacher? If you need more help, turn to page 75. Let children think of the questions with your prompting. (For example, What would Jesus want you to do if your sister asked to borrow your favorite toy? How would Jesus want you to act when you are playing a game with your friend?) Turn their statements into questions and write the questions on a large index card to take home. (Do I cheat when I play with friends? Do I share with others?) Make sure you have at least ten questions.

Begins on page 32

Conversation One

It is difficult to admit that we have done something wrong. Yet, when we can admit that we are wrong, we experience the sorrow that comes from recognizing the pain that our harmful choices have caused. Sorrow for sin, called **contrition**, is a moment of growth in the life of a Christian. Sorrow is the second step in reconciling any relationship, and clearly needed in restoring our relationship with God. The source of joy for all Christians is our conviction that God is always waiting for us to return to his embrace.

1. Invite children to share their favorite part of the opening prayer on pages 32 and 33. Share what part you liked best. Make sure you each explain why you liked the part you chose.

Note: Silence is an important element of worship. It provides time for quiet reflection and prayer. It allows rest. It makes us more attentive. It frames important words and actions.

- 2. Read together *Signs of Faith* on page 34 and ask children when they are most likely to see people kneeling. Ask them, why is kneeling a good way to pray? (*Possible answers: Being on our knees reminds us that God is greater than us; we kneel to show respect; we don't kneel in other places so kneeling reminds us of God.)*
- **3.** Complete the *Reflect* activity on page 34.

Conversation Two

- **4.** Turn to page 35 and read *Ask for Forgiveness* and *Signs of Faith* with your child.
- **5.** Ask children to share an example from their life. When was a time you asked someone to forgive you? Ask them how it felt to say, "Sorry." (Remember to say that it is not always easy to ask for forgiveness. Talk about responses we may receive. Assure your child it is worth the risk of rejection. Asking for forgiveness gives us peace.)
- **6.** Explain that asking for forgiveness is a gift to the person you have hurt, but also a gift to yourself.

Conversation Three

7. Read together Faith Focus on page 36.

Before you read *A Woman Who Was Sorry* remind children that this story comes from the sacred words of Scripture. Ask them to prepare for this word by silently asking the Holy Spirit to open their heart so that God's word will plant itself in them like a seed planted in a garden.

Read children the story on page 37. Ask them to describe it back to you.

Now, discuss the questions:

How did the woman show Jesus she was sorry for her sins? (She cried, washed Jesus' feet with her tears, dried his feet with her hair, kissed Jesus' feet, and poured oil on them.)

How do you tell Jesus you are sorry? (Possible responses: I tell him; I say a prayer; I say it to another person)

8. Help your child complete the *We Are Sorry* activity sheet.

Note: The writer of the Gospel of Luke tends to pair people in his stories, contrasting their reactions and inviting the reader to make his or her own judgement. In this story, a Pharisee, a religious figure, is contrasted to a woman labeled as sinful. Yet, this woman performs the acts of hospitality that should have been done by the host who invited Jesus to eat at his house. This woman shows faith in Jesus' forgiveness.

9. To close your time together, read pages 38 and 39. This is a great time to share with your child how wonderful this experience will be for them. It is also an excellent opportunity to get in touch with your feelings about this sacrament and rediscover the gift that God offers us in Penance—the experience of his forgiveness.



10 mins.

- 2. Conclude with the Closing Blessing found on page 50.







Chapter 5 Begins on page 42

Conversation One

When two people love each other, they use words such as "I love you," and concrete signs, such as embracing each other, in order to express their love. If one of the persons stopped using these signs, the other might begin to wonder if he or she were still loved.

In the Sacrament of Penance, God forgives us through the words of absolution or forgiveness and the imposition of hands upon the penitent. The words of the prayer reveal that this forgiveness comes through the death and Resurrection of Jesus. The cross is a central sign of forgiveness because it shows God's willingness to give his only Son to atone for our sins.

1. Invite children to share their favorite part of the opening prayer on pages 42 and 43. Share what part you liked best. Make sure you each explain why you liked the part you chose.

Note: The imposition of hands in the context of the Sacrament of Penance signifies the presence of the Holy Spirit, working through the minister to free the penitent from the power of sin. The gesture also reminds us that Penance is a Sacrament of Healing.

- 2. Read together Signs of Faith on page 44.
- **3.** Work together to complete the *Reflect* activity on page 44. Share with your child an example from your own life.

- **4.** Turn to page 45 and read *Brought Together Again* and *Signs of Faith* with your child.

Chapter 6 Begins on page 52

Conversation One

Today, we will reflect on the meaning of penance, the final movement in the Sacrament of Penance. When someone is genuinely sorry for a wrong they have done and has asked for forgiveness, they often go to great lengths to show the other person how sorry they truly are. Penance can be understood in that light. Penance has a two-fold purpose; it serves as atonement (amends or reparation) for sin and as a sign of conversion (willingness to change).

When we celebrate this sacrament, we leave with the firm resolve to change what needs to be changed in our lives in order that we would grow in holiness—that we would become the person that God created us to be. The penance we carry is a sign of both our desire to make amends and the hope of our becoming more authentic disciples of Christ. Those who experience God's loving forgiveness in this sacrament, offer mercy and love in their actions and relationships.

1. Invite your child to share with you what part of the opening prayer on pages 52 and 53 reminded them of Mass. Share what you think peace means and what the world would be like in we lived in peace. Think of a person that your child knows who lives a truly peaceful life.

Note: The holy water used in the Sacrament of Baptism makes us one with Christ. Holy water is used at other times to bless people and objects. The water helps us to remember God's place in our lives. Just now, in our ritual you were sprinkled with water to remind you of your Baptism. The other ritual action we performed was the Sign of Peace. When we offer peace to one another, it is always the Lord's peace we give—a peace that begins with our trust that Jesus can turn all darkness into light.

2. Read together *Signs of Faith* on page 54, then help your child to complete the activity.

- **3.** Turn to page 55 and read together *We Are Reconciled* and *Signs of Faith*.
- 4. Review with your child that conversion means to grow and change so we become more like Jesus. Think of a way you have seen your child grow emotionally or spiritually in the last year. Children often say, "When I was little..." to describe their own growth in understanding. Share what you have noticed with your child and tell him/her how proud you are when he/she does something good. (He has learned to take his turn. She shares with others. He is doing better at handling anger or disappointment.) Now, share a way that you hope to grow. (Make more time to be at home. Volunteer in your local community. Pray more.)

Conversation Three

5. Read together *Faith Focus* on page 56.

Before you read *Jesus Appears to the Disciples*, remind your child that you are about to hear from Scripture, the Word of God. We are Jesus' disciples in this world and so Jesus is speaking to us right now in this place. Sharing God's word is one of the most special things a parent and child can do. Take a moment before you read, and silently ask the Holy Spirit to help you to hear what you need to hear in order to help you to grow in faith, hope, and love.

Read the Scripture story to your child. Ask him/her to tell the story back to you, then discuss the questions:

What do you think Jesus was sending the disciples to do? (Possible responses: to share God's love, to forgive sins, to teach about God.)

How are you forgiving of your friends? (Possible responses: I say "You are Forgiven; or "It's OK", I do not hold a grudge.)

6. Take out the *We Go Forth* activity sheet and work with your child to create a peace pole.

Note: Despite their betrayal, denial, and inability to remain faithful, the first words of the Risen Jesus to his disciples are, "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). John tells us that the risen Jesus not only speaks a message of peace to his disciples, but also affects that peace in the relationship he has with them. Jesus' words teach us that nothing the disciples could say or do could change God's desire for them—everlasting life with him.
