

Correlation of Faith Fusion to the Adaptation of Doctrinal Elements of a Curriculum Framework for the Development of Catechetical Materials for Young People of High School Age

Purpose: This correlation demonstrates how Faith Fusion corresponds to the USCCB's Framework for the Development of Catechetical Materials for High School Curriculum. While primarily developed for use with Parish and Youth Ministry Programs, this correlation can be helpful when using Faith Fusion as the text for an introduction or overview to the Catholic Church course in a High School setting.

How to read the chart: The Framework sections and doctrinal elements are located in Column 1, and the corresponding unit, chapter, or pages from Faith Fusion are located in Column 2.
